### **MATERIALS LIST**

1. Rotary cutter – There are several kinds on the market. We recommend the medium size (45mm) to start. We like to use one that closes automatically when not in use, so that we do not cut ourselves. They are VERY sharp!!
2. Cutting Mat – These come in several sizes. One 12' x18" is good for getting started. Take good care of your mat. Always store it flat and out of the sun so that it doesn't warp.
3. Rulers – There are many available and you will eventually want more than one. Be sure your first one is a standard brand because if you use more than one ruler on a project, it's important to use the same brand for truly accurate cutting. Because the lines are different, it's hard to cut exactly using different brand rulers. Omnigrd rulers are easy to read. Two sizes you might choose are 6 1/2"x 24" or 4"x14".
4. Scissors – Have one pair of sewing shears and one small pair of scissors or snips that you save for us on fabric only. Guard these against family use. Also have one decent pair of paper scissors.
5. Seam Ripper – You will never outgrow your need for seam rippers as long as you quilt. There are several kinds. The white Clover brand seems to be the best quality.
6. Sewing Machine – all you need to get started is a machine with a good straight stitch.
7. Pins – The .5mm quilter's pins with colored ball tops are a good choice. They go through fabric easily and are easy to see.
8. Fabric-bring a selection of your choice of light, dark and medium fabric that you would use for you sampler blocks.

Note: You can get most of this at the Loft in Gualala, any large fabric store, or online at Clothilde, Connecting Threads, JoAnn's and Nancy's Notions are several sights we both have used. There are others that you will find in your own search for quilting notions.
